


## **BIRTH - 3** MONTHS

#### What should my child be able to do?

Remember, children develop at their own rate.




#### TALKING

- Smiles at caregivers.
- Cry changes for different needs.
- Makes cooing sounds or sounds of happiness.

#### **HEARING & UNDERSTANDING**

- Startles at loud sounds.
- Calms or smiles when spoken to.Seems to recognize your voice.

#### **ACTIVITIES**



- Sing to your child.
- Play Peek-a-Boo.
- TALK, TALK, TALK!
- Read from colorful books.
- Talk back to them when they make a sound. Pretend to have a conversation with them.

 None except video chatting with an adult.

### **4-6 MONTHS**

# What should my child be able to do?

Remember, children develop at their own rate.

#### TALKING

- Babbles and coos during play.
- Babbling includes sounds such as "pa, ba, ma."
- Makes sounds to show they are happy or sad
- Laughs and giggles.


#### **HEARING & UNDERSTANDING**

- Moves eyes to locate source of sound.
- Responds to changes in intonation and voice.
- Pays attention to music and toys with noises.
- Responds to "no" by stopping or pausing.



#### ACTIVITIES

- Read to your child and talk about the pictures in the book
- Shake rattle or other toys that make noise for baby to locate the noise.
- TALK, TALK, TALK!

## 7 MONTHS - 1 YEAR

## What should my child be able to do?


Remember, children develop at their own rate.

#### TALKING

- Babbles sounds, such as, babababa.
  - Uses sounds and gestures to get your attention.
- Points to objects.
- Uses gestures (waving bye-bye or clapping).
- Says words, such as, hi, dada, mama, or uh-oh.

#### **HEARING & UNDERSTANDING**

- Looks to you when you call their name.
- Starts to understand simple words and phrases, like "No" and "Come here".
- Understands words for common object, such as cup, milk, baby, and car.



- Play with bubbles and say the words, "pop," "more", "bubble", etc.
- Use self-talk: talk about what you are doing around your child.
- Be repetitive. Repeat simple words and phrases.



**1-2 YEARS** 


# What should my child be able to do?

Remember, children develop at their own rate.



#### **HEARING & UNDERSTANDING**

- Points to common body parts when you ask.
- Follows one step directions "roll the ball".
- Points to pictures when you name them.
- Enjoys being read to.



#### ACTIVITIES

- Use parallel talk: narrate what your child sees and does "you're eating applesauce", "you see a dog" etc.
- Expand sentences your child says for example if your child says "dog" say "Yes, that is a big brown dog."



#### **SCREEN TIME**

 Less than one hour and co-watching an educational program with a caregiver, such as Ms. Rachel



2-3 YEARS

# What should my child be able to do?

Remember, children develop at their own rate.



#### **HEARING & UNDERSTANDING**

- Understands new words every day.
  - Understands opposites, such as go-stop, big-little, and up-down.
  - Follows 2-step directions, such as "Get the cup and put it on the table."



#### ACTIVITIES

- Sing simple songs and nursery rhymes with your child.
- Help your child learn new words by naming objects, and talking about what you do with them. "This is my cup. I can use it to drink milk & water."

• 0-3 hours in an entire week.

3-4 YEARS

# What should my child be able to do?

Remember, children develop at their own rate.

# Answers simple WH questions: who, what, where. Uses pronouns: you, me, we, they. Puts 4 words together "I go to park". Uses some plurals such as "dogs", birds".


#### **HEARING & UNDERSTANDING**

- Recognizes colors
- Groups items into categories: animals, foods, etc.
- Is able to recognize shapes.
- Is able to identify family members such as aunt, uncle, grandma, grandpa.





- Find objects around the house and have your child group them by category.
- Look at pictures and have your child tell a story about what is happening.
- Read books and ask your child to recall details or their favorite part.

4-5 YEARS

# What should my child be able to do?

Remember, children develop at their own rate.

#### TALKING

- Says all speech sounds in a word. May make mistakes on sounds that are harder to say, such as l, s, r, v, z, ch, sh, and th.
- Names letters and numbers.
- Uses sentences with actions words: "jumps", "runs" etc.

#### **HEARING & UNDERSTANDING**

- Understands first, next, last.
- Able to follow multistep directions such as "put on your shoes, get your jacket and grab your bookbag."
- Understands today, yesterday, and tomorrow.



#### **ACTIVITIES**

- Play a guessing game where you describe an object and have your child guess, or play I-spy.
- Include your child in daily activities such as laundry or grocery shopping.
- Keep teaching your child new words.



#### **SCREEN TIME**

• 0-3 hours in an entire week.
